## **Context: East Midlands County Combined Authority**



- In August 2022, Derbyshire County Council, Nottinghamshire County Council, Derby City Council and Nottingham City Council signed a £1.14 billion devolution deal with Government.
- The proposed deal would see our region become the **first ever Mayoral Combined County Authority in the country** and would see an extra £38 million a year coming to the East Midlands from 2024, addressing years of historically low investment in our area.
- Funding and powers would move from Government to the region to help the 2.2 million people who live here.

#### Vision:

For the people who live and work here to be better connected, more competitive and more prosperous within an inclusive East Midlands CCA area

#### **Objectives** :

- Boosting productivity, pay, jobs and living standards
- Spreading opportunities and improving public services
- Restoring a sense of community, local pride and belonging
- Empowering local leaders and communities



### What is the East Midlands Combined Authority?



- A **public consultation**, published in March 2023, showed broad support for the deal and the establishment of a Mayoral Combined County Authority.
- The **primary legislation** enabling the deal to proceed received Royal Assent in October 2023.
- Following Government's decision to proceed, each of the constituent members will consider consenting to the Establishment Order to create EMCCA in **December 2023**.
- Inaugural mayoral election planned in May 2024.
- The EMCCA is an accountable, legal body, like any other local authority
- All existing councils across Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire will still exist as individual authorities.

## Why have a CCA?



- This is a once in a generation opportunity to secure more funding and powers for the region. It takes power away from Westminster, placing more decisions at a local level.
- A Mayor can focus on the big issues affecting our whole region meaning we get more jobs, more provision for training and skills, better public transport, more investment in housing, and action to protect the environment.
- The East Midlands has suffered from years of underinvestment. Devolution will bring more money into the region, resulting in a stronger local economy and better services for residents.
- A Mayoral combined county authority will give the region the national voice it deserves

   championing major infrastructure projects, lobbying government to ensure promises
   are kept
- The Mayoral election is a chance for local residents to shape the future of our region.
- Critically, the initial deal is **just a starting point** the true benefits and economic value of devolution are still to come.

## What will it do?



The EMCCA will have a number of devolved powers from Government and will undertake certain functions.

#### These include:

- > Develop a pipeline of activity for the **£1.14bn investment fund** of £38 million per year over 30 years.
- Transport via a brand-new City Region Sustainable Transport Settlement of over £1.5bn. Creating and delivering a single integrated Local Transport Plan across the area (e.g. more joined up public transport, cross boundary ticketing, strategic planning and decision making on transport infrastructure)
- Adult Education Budget (AEB) £50m per year, making sure the provision of local skills meets the needs of the economy targeted to local need
- > £18m early investment into the area on housing and net zero,
- £17 million for the building of new homes on brownfield land
- > New funding for **capacity building** as we establish the new authority

At the moment, the EMCCA is not proposed to hold an economic development function .... so local governance arrangements will be important:

• Strategic Leaders Board – new arrangements made up of all 10 local authorities in Derbyshire to set and drive economic growth policies; this will include visitor economy (e.g. via the LVEP), transport, skills, routes to employment etc

Supported by:

• New **business advisory board** made up of - business rep organisations (Chamber, FSB), colleges, universities, businesses and sector-focused organisations such as Visit Peak District and Derbyshire



#### **Guiding investment decisions:**

The EMCCA will develop a number of strategies to guide spend of the devolved funding.

- Regional Growth Strategy
- Local Transport Plan
- Strategic Skills Plan
- Investment Strategy/ Fund
- East Midlands Investment Zone: will help draw in further funding to support investment

# What it means for visitor economy



Within the scope of these strategies there will be opportunities for the visitor economy e.g:

- ✓ To have priorities supported in the Growth Strategy
- To have skills and employment routes (apprenticeships, traineeships etc) supported in the Skills Plan
- ✓ Sector development plans supported by funding and investment
- Can tailor AEB to our communities and not have to reflect national rules/guidelines or priorities
- AEB can address local skills gaps providing pathways into different sectors
- Strategic approach to business support across EMCCA consistent approach
- ✓ Opportunity to take a strategic approach working with VPDD and others to promote the tourist attractions such as:
  - Peak District National Park
  - National Forest
  - Chatsworth House
  - Hardwick
  - Bolsover
  - National Forest
  - Etc
